In addition, we will support your own personal and professional development looking at taking the first steps in the





Lung Cancer Europe

LuCE (http://www.lungcancereurope.eu/) provides a European platform for already existing lung cancer patient advocacy groups and supports the establishment of national lung cancer patient groups in different European countries where such groups do not yet exist.



The Annual General Meeting took place at the Steinberger Airport Hotel, Frankfurt, 13th and 14th May 2017.

This provided a valuable opportunity to get to meet members and associate members from European countries.

LuCE President, Stefania Vallone, informed attendees that in November 2016, in collaboration with European Cancer League, LuCE organized a session in the EU Parliament with the aim of highlighting the key challenges and disparities still persisting in lung cancer care.

During the event the LuCE Report on Challenges in lung cancer in Europe was officially launched, followed by a Call to Action during which signatures confirming support were obtained.

LuCE has taken on a new role to act as fund holder for Global Action for Cancer Patients, a global patient network with the focus to value cancer care from the patient and caregiver perspective.

During the past year LuCE has also improved the educational programs addressed to patients, caregivers and survivors. On 23/03/2017 the 1st LuCE webinar titled Advocating for access to treatments. What should we know? was aired, with more webinars planned.

Presentations at the AGM included and educational session on screening and a workshop on media training.

Attending the LuCE AGM provided a valuable opportunity to meet European colleagues with a firm reminder of the disparities in lung cancer care, and access to treatments, across Europe.

New Initiative – Aneurin Bevan Health Board

We have an exciting new initiative here in Aneurin Bevan University Health Board (ABUHB); a new rehabilitation programme. The plan is that all USC Lung rapid access patients will have access to this programme.

The tittle of the initiative is 'The Rehabilitation and Optimisation Programme (POP)', it is funded by the Welsh Assembly Government and will run until March 2018.

There is emerging research evidence that suggests addressing any health issues patients may have early can prepare the body for any forthcoming treatment. This may result in patients having fewer side effects, or that side effects potentially may be less severe. It is hoped individuals will not only feel better but also improve recovery after any treatment.

It is a new approach to improving health before treatment. This rehabilitation will take place whilst patients are undergoing investigations or tests; pre diagnosis. Patients will be seen by either, a Physiotherapist, a Dietitian, an Occupational Therapist or a combination of all three. The team will assess the nutritional, physical, practical, social and emotional needs of patients, with the aim of improving the individual's overall health and wellbeing. The Physiotherapist will work with individuals to help set achievable goals to improve fitness, strength and function prior to treatment.

The Occupational Therapist will work with individuals to help support them carry out daily activities or fulfil usual roles; such as caring for oneself and others, getting around the home and community, and improve participation in work, education or leisure activities. Occupational Therapists can also support changes to mood and emotions as a result of health conditions and/or treatment.

The Dietitian can help if individuals are experiencing problems with eating and drinking. They can provide practical advice about diet and nutrition which can help optimise wellbeing and quality of life during this challenging time.

What I find particularly exciting about this project is it is for all appropriate potential lung cancer patients, regardless of performance status and stage of disease; it is not limited to patients undergoing curative treatment. I will be sure to update everyone at the end of the initiative

Roy Castle Lung Cancer Foundation Bursary Scheme

Roy Castle Lung Cancer Foundation are pleased to offer a new bursary for nurses towards the lung cancer module forming part of the University of Manchester's 2017 'MSc Specialist Practice: Cancer Pathway'. If you are thinking of applying, either as a standalone module or as part of the MSc, the charity can provide you with a grant of £500 to help with your course.

If the course is funded by your employer or another organisation, you can use the money towards academic support and books.

The module, starting this September, is taught by a combination of flexible online learning and face to face classroom sessions. This module covers the management of lung cancer. It includes the investigation, diagnosis, staging and treatment pathways used to manage the disease. Factors likely to drive changes in how lung cancer services will develop and be managed are also covered. These will include the roles of health education and behaviour change. Symptom management and palliative care issues are considered and applied to the context of the presentation and management of advanced disease. Concepts such as stigma and blame will also be explored within the module.

The module enables practitioners to critically analyse their knowledge and



understanding of lung cancer and explore the scope of professional practice, developing and applying the skills and competencies needed to provide quality care to patients and their families.

The module aims to:

- Enhance practice through the acquisition, extension and critical appraisal of existing knowledge and skills that develop the basis of a lifelong learning approach to delivering care
- Provide opportunity for reflection on practice to develop proposals for change in current service/practice provision.
- Give opportunity for inter-professional learning that leads to a greater understanding for multi-disciplinary working

Why do it?

Studying a higher level specialist lung cancer module offers many benefits. Being able to apply specialist knowledge not only promotes insight into how to provide patients with better care, but can also help you to advance your career.

Who can apply?

You can apply for the bursary if you meet any of the following criteria:

- You are a member of the Lung Cancer Nurses Forum
- You are involved in running one of the Roy Castle Lung Cancer Supporters Groups
- You spend a significant amount of your time involved in the care and nursing of those affected by lung cancer this may need to be verified by your current employer

You will need to apply for the Manchester MSc or PGcert with the lung cancer module included, or apply for the lung cancer module on a standalone basis. The bursary will only be provided should you be accepted on the course.

Mesothelioma UK - making a difference

Mesothelioma UK is a national resource centre dedicated to providing free specialist information, support, and improved care and treatment. We offer support to patients through a dedicated helpline and a team of specialist nurses, and also work with health care professionals and other organisations to fund research into mesothelioma. The centre has strong links with the NLCFN and welcomes opportunities to support forum members in their mesothelioma practice.

Mesothelioma UK CNS's

To date, we have funded 12 mesothelioma clinical nurse specialists (CNS) across the country, 5 of which were appointed in the last 12 months. A further 5 nurses are due to take up posts later this year.

We now have nurses in post at Leicester, Portsmouth, Manchester, Sheffield, Newcastle, Oxford, Glasgow, Wales, Yorkshire, Plymouth and Cambridge with London, Southampton, Kent and Liverpool appointing to new positions this autumn.

In 2016/17 the nurses saw around 473 new patients, handled over 600 calls to the helpline, delivered 66 presentations regionally, nationally and internationally and attended 235 meetings and support groups, representing Mesothelioma UK.

Christine Jones, one of the charity's clinical nurse specialists, described what it is like to be a Meso UK nurse: "Being a Meso UK nurse, to me, is an honour and a privilege. I never underestimate, or take for granted, the gift of being allowed to accompany those afflicted with asbestos related diseases as they walk their pathway, and equally I never fail to be amazed at the support we, as a team, offer each other. It is, quite simply, the best job on the planet."

Funding Nurse Led research

In June 2016 the NLCFN Research Interest Group awarded Mesothelioma UK's first Nursing research grant to a team led by Professor Angela Tod. The study, which is due to report later this year, have been exploring patient and carer experience of being told their diagnosis. It is hoped the findings will lead to the development of guidelines for informing patients and their carers about a mesothelioma diagnosis.

Pat Stone Meso Support/ Mesothelioma UK grant awarded to study which aims to reduce the need for diagnostic surgery

The grant, for £21,795, has been awarded to Amy Kerr, Senior thoracic surgery research nurse at the Medical Innovation Development Research

Unit (MIDRU) at Heartlands Hospital in Birmingham. The grant will fund a study into non-invasive diagnosis of mesothelioma using structured light plethysmography (SLP).

SLP is a new diagnosis method which measures chest wall motion which can highlight differences according to the disease which is causing abnormalities on chest X rays or CT scans.

Amy said: "I must say that I am humbled, honoured, and at the same time excited to receive the award from Pat Stone Meso Support, Mesothelioma UK and the National Lung Cancer Forum for Nurses (NLCFN). This funding will give us a fantastic opportunity to transform the diagnosis pathway for Mesothelioma patients for the better."

The non-invasive process only takes five minutes and uses squares of light in a chequerboard to detect chest wall motion by changes in the size of the squares as the patient breathes.

Liz Darlison, Mesothelioma UK Director of Services and Consultant Nurse, added: "We're delighted to be working with Pat Stone Meso Support and the National Lung Cancer Forum for Nurses (NLCFN) to offer this grant for such an innovative study. We're excited to hear about the results of the study which we hope will inform current diagnostic processes and perhaps lessen the need for surgery for people with suspected mesothelioma."

Graham Pound from Pat Stone Meso Support said: "Pat Stone Meso Support is extremely proud to be associated with this opportunity which has the potential to further the understanding and care of sufferers of this cancer which continues to take the lives of substantially more people than are killed on our roads each year."

A pilot study at MIDRU with 15 patients found significant differences is chest wall motion and has shown to be a promising tool to help diagnose the cause of pleural disease such as the differences between mesothelioma and benign pleural thickening. Emerging results of the study will be presented at the National Lung Cancer Forum for Nurses conference in November 2018.

Integrating SLP into future clinical practice to diagnose mesothelioma could improve the diagnostic process for patients with possible mesothelioma and reduce the need for hospital admission for invasive investigations.

It could reduce the length of time patients have to wait for a diagnosis and it offers patients, who are not well enough to have surgery, a more confident diagnosis for their pleural disease which could help provide evidence for compensation claims.

BTOG Nursing Workshop: Thursday 25 January 2018

This year we have canvassed NLCFN members to identify themes for the Nursing Workshop at BTOG IN January 2018. The themes need to be a priority for NLCFN members and lung cancer nursing practice. There also need to be some new, innovative research or evaluation that can be presented linked to the topic.

In response to the replies out overall theme is Service innovation and evaluation. There will be two presentations and time for discussion. Topics will be:

• Specialist palliative care for people with lung cancer And

• Nurse-led rapid access, video linked, lung cancer clinics

Research Training

In April 2016 the NLCFN ran the BIL Torch for Nursing Research Workshop. This training aimed to increase the confidence and skills of nurses working in lung cancer regarding research. We are in the process of seeking funding to extend this initiative and run further training collaboratively between the NLCFN and UKONS.

We will feedback on the TORCH for Nursing Work in the next newsletter.

Small Grants

Three applications for small grants were received in 2017. Two individuals have been awarded small grants. These are:-

- Maureen King, Papworth
 - Multi-Centred, prospective, three-month audit to identify the number of primary lung cancer patients, readmitted to hospital following surgery within 30 days of discharge.
- Sarah Morgan
 - The impact of the lung cancer nurse specialist in facilitating a rapid access lung cancer clinic with remote access to the specialist clinician.

Joint RIG / Thoracic Sub-group meeting

In June 2017 the RIG and Thoracic Sub-group of NLCFN had a joint meeting. This was a very enjoyable and interesting day. It was great to see and hear about the shared interests of the two groups.

In the afternoon Matt Johnson ran a consultation discussion about the emerging findings from his study on communication of risk of recurrence following lung cancer surgery.

It was decided that we would hold a joint meeting once a year.

Journal of Clinical Nursing

The work of specialist nursing has been under scrutiny for many years in the UK due to a perception that it is not cost-effective. A common issue is the lack of consistency of iob titles. which causes confusion to the public, employing organisations, colleagues

and commissioners of services. Lack of consistency has implications for the wider perception of advanced specialist practice in the worldwide community and the workforce more generally. In her study, published in the September issue of the Journal of Clinical Nursing see Alison Leary, trustee of NLCFN, aims to understand the variation in job titles in the UK

As most /all of us are aware John previously held the position of Chair of the NLCFN. He remains committed to NLCFN sitting on the Board of Trustees and is an active member of the NLCFN Research Interest Group.

Thoracic surgical group update

The latest thoracic surgical group project is a 3 month, multicentre readmission audit. The aims of this multi-centred audit are, to identify over a three-month period the number of primary lung cancer patients following thoracic surgery readmitted to hospital within 30 days of discharge. In addition, the audit aims to identity the reasons for readmission, to identify any common factors for readmission between centres and to identify any lesson learnt to facilitate service improvements. The centres taking part are Papworth, Birmingham, Leeds, Leicester, Brompton, Oxford, Belfast and Dublin, the audit is being supported by the Audit Department at Papworth Hospital.

Our last TSG meeting was a joint meeting with the research interest group (RIG). In addition to our regular project work we talked about the role of the RIG and the support that can be offered to our members. We then took part in a research consultation with Mathew Johnson who is part way through his PhD project looking at the disclosure of the risk of recurrence following resection of primary lung cancer. The collaboration was helpful to all who attended and we hope to hold joint meetings again in the future.



Nurse-led clinics at Maidstone and Tunbridge Wells NHS Trust

The Lung CNS team at Maidstone and Tunbridge Wells NHS Trust run a nurse led oncology review clinic reviewing patients on TKI's and chemotherapy. In 2016 more patients started to have immunotherapy treatment via the EAMS scheme and this was having an impact on the Consultants clinics. The nursing team started to review patients within their already established nurse led clinic and it soon became apparent that an assessment tool was required to ensure safe and standardised practice. tronic assessment tool which has been in use since May 2017 to assess immunotherapy toxicities. This is proving to be very effective and following an educational event held at our Academic Centre attended by 70 people including Doctors, Pharmacists and Nurses throughout Kent has been rolled out and used regionally.

The workshop was held on the 15-16th May was well attended; with delegates being very enthusiastic following Jeanette Draffen's inspiring presentation about previous workshops and the impact this has had on improving the patient experience and care. Also the recognition of previous posters, poster presentations and awards that have been achieved from the workshop was highlighted.

The project leads for 2017 are June Morley and Marie Eaton. We split into 4 sub-groups to concentrate on the work to be done:

• Literature review • NLCFN survey • Consultation of primary care workers • Consultation of patients and carers

Responses to the survey of the membership was excellent with over 60 members responding to the survey.

The work is on-going, with emails, teleconferences and conversations to enhance the support provided by Lilly Oncology. We will present the findings at the NLCFN conference in November.
